Call to order: The meeting was called to order by Linda.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes for both July 26, 2020 and September, 2020 were read and approved. Megan moved to approve and Jan seconded

Financial Report:

Jan moved that we approve the financial report and Sue M. seconded. It was noted that there was \$20 that came in after the last report so there was \$455 in donations instead of \$435.

Old Business:

School Supplies – Jan said that the supplies that we took to the Library have not been put out yet. We discussed it and decided to have Ann do it around Christmas so that way if the kids need new supplies for the 2<sup>nd</sup> ½ of the year they would be available for them.

Fire Department donation – Megan moved and Carmen seconded that we donate \$300 to the Lowden Fire Department. The check will be sent to the Fire Chief.

Sue will look at a local area that could use donations like this.

Jim and Jan have gotten items from HACAP and they did have some perishable ones that they are currently storing in the freezer in the kitchen. Discussion was held again on a freezer for the food pantry. We will see how the next month goes and if they receive more items.

New Business:

Upper Room devotional – Pastor Sue and Linda are going to look at costs of another one that is similar but Carmen moved and Sue M. seconded that we pay for the subscription to one of these.

We also discussed having Missions possibly adopt a room in the church, working with Building and Grounds on this. We would have a room and make a wish list of things that need to be worked on and things that would be good to add to the room.

When we celebrate All Saints' Day, and tenderly honor those loved ones we have lost this past year, it's important to remember what it means to be a "saint." Saints are not just those who have died and joined the Saints in Light. In the early church, all baptized believers were called saints. That's you and me, boys & girls. And if thinking of ourselves as saints makes us feel uncomfortable or unworthy – that's okay. Because we aren't saints on our own. Calling ourselves and one another 'saints' reminds us that there is Something and Someone greater than us. God is the One who makes us holy.

Calling ourselves "saints" reminds us that in our baptism, we are bound to God and to one another. We are saints not because we have checked off all the right things on the "to-do" list, but because we are loved and forgiven by God. It is the perfect reminder that we are not in this alone. The prayer from the UCC Service for Re-Affirming our Baptismal Vows (and the Rite of Confirmation) sums it up beautifully: **O God, my God, known to me in Jesus Christ, I give myself to You as Your own, to love and serve You faithfully all the days of my life. Amen.**

A saint lives fully in the waters of baptismal forgiveness. Saints are not "right" or "good;" saints are FORGIVEN. They are regular people who live their lives in simple obedience to Jesus Christ. Saints are not mushy people who never make waves, who never disagree, who never make mistakes. Saints are those who live their lives connected to Jesus Christ, studying His word, His ways, His love.

We are "called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, 1 Cor. 12:2) when we have given ourselves over completely to God. Saints are willing to admit that we are not in control. God is. At our best moments, that is why it's difficult for us to call ourselves saints – because it takes work to let God be in charge of *everything* in our lives. And it means walking that very fine line between "thinking of ourselves less" and "thinking less of ourselves."

Pastor Larry Bethune puts it this way:

*"If you want someone to look up to, look down, and look around. Saints are the people not noticed for the good they do because they do not seek attention or credit or control. They just do the work - day after day, year after year, as long as they can, as long as they're here. They would never consider themselves saints because they are too humble. In fact, they don't think often of themselves at all because they are thinking mainly of others. They are cooking meals for the hungry, visiting the sick, cleaning house for the dying, feeding a friend at a nursing home. Look for them to be here a few hours before everybody else to chop the celery for the potato salad or quietly cleaning up after the last amen. They are beautiful without worrying about their appearance. They are strong without working out in the gym. They are faithful, not out of a sense of duty, but because it's who they are. Meet them in almost any circumstance of life, even in poverty or illness or loss, and they speak of their gratitude for the tender mercies of God. [Ask about] ... their struggles and sorrows, and they tell you of their victories and joys. Ask them to pray for you because they will. These are the saints."*

In a world that wants to focus on all that divides us, we are called to remember that we belong to God *and* to one another. Our unity is based on the radical love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. When we remember that – we can and will find common ground in Him.

We may not agree on everything – but giving myself to God as God's own helps me give you the benefit of the doubt. God gives us the strength and the patience to listen and to love, even when we passionately disagree about the details. God gives us the wisdom and the desire to find our unity in Him. That is the only way we can begin to heal this hurting world – whether it is in our homes, our community, or our nation. **O God, my God, known to me in Jesus Christ, I give myself to You as Your own, to love and serve You faithfully all the days of my life. Amen**

The best way to live into these vows? Live them. Day in and day out. Teach the gospel by loving God and loving your neighbor as yourself. Surround yourself with other saints who know they are sinners, and learn and laugh together by immersing yourself in the waters of baptismal love. Let God be God - of your life, your finances, your schedule, your relationships. When you make a mistake, ask for forgiveness and move on. As often as you encounter water in your life, remember your baptism, and live without looking back.

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES  
Sept. 17, 2020**

On Sept. 17, 2020, at 6:00 p.m., President Aaron Horman called the regular monthly meeting of the church council to order. Present were Pastor Sue, Sandy Esbaum, Randy Horman, Duane Lasack, Jon Mansfield, David Niermeyer and Janice Strackbein. Pastor Sue opened with a prayer and reflection time regarding favorite hymns.

Duane made a motion to accept the minutes of the Aug. 20, 2020, meeting, second by David. Motion carried.

David made a motion to accept the financial reports, second by Randy. Motion carried. Discussion was held on procedures for recording/depositing memorial gifts and consolidating church bank accounts.

Pastor Sue discussed her intended office hours (Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 am to 2 pm or by appointment) and contact methods.

David reported the Missions Committee school supply drive was successful. The committee is collecting cleaning supplies in September and office supplies in October for church use.

A bid of \$3,969.72 from Steve's Mirror and Glass to install a frame and tempered glass to raise the balcony railing was shared. It was the consensus of the council to not proceed with the project at this time.

Aaron reported that the Alliant Energy rebate for the new furnace had been submitted.

Pastor Sue, David and Sandy will continue to work on updating employee job descriptions.

Aaron and Sandy will begin work on preparing the PPP loan forgiveness application.

It was the consensus of the council to not renew the USPS bulk rate permit since the Herald is mostly distributed electronically and there are other mailing options available that do not require a permit.

A member cleanup day is scheduled for Sept. 20 to work on a variety of outdoor maintenance projects around the church and parsonage.

Duane made a motion to rent the parsonage to Jon Mansfield, Randy seconded. Motion carried; Jon abstained. The initial term will be for a 6-month period effective Oct. 1 with month-by-month renewals up to the 12<sup>th</sup> month. Jon will also be responsible for all utilities and snow removal around the parsonage. Aaron will draft the lease agreement.

Discussion was held surrounding a stewardship campaign. Pastor Sue will engage a group of members and report back at the next meeting.

Discussion was also held regarding formation of the search committee and next steps in the pastoral search process. Pastor Sue will share information with the council to review prior to the next meeting.

The closing question of the night was "What excites you about the future of Zion? What concerns you about the future of Zion?"

The meeting was closed with a prayer.

The next meeting is Oct. 21, 2020, at 6:00 p.m.

- The Building & Grounds Committee's proposal for organizations and committees to "adopt-a-room" was approved. This will be an effort to identify renovations needed in the various spaces of the church.
- To enhance communication and improve timeliness of distribution, church council, organization and committee meeting "highlights" only will be published in the Herald newsletter. Full meeting minutes will be available at the church or sent by request.
- The council approved a preliminary process to consolidate 24 church bank accounts to be effective Jan. 1.
- Church staff job description updates and performance reviews will be completed by the end of the year.
